Volunteer Spotlight:

Sherie Ellington

Mason Health's newest volunteer is working in the Development Office to assist with Marketing duties. **Sherie Ellington** comes to Mason Health with vast experience in marketing, communications and community building.

From the time she was 2 years old, Ellington grew up in Shaki, Nigeria, where her father worked as the only doctor, a trauma surgeon, in a modest hospital, while her mother worked as a nurse.

Ellington was homeschooled by her mother, while her sisters attended boarding school. They lived in a small house without any amenities — "We filtered our

water, had no indoor electricity after sunset, and even shared bathwater during the dry season," Ellington said.

"My parents were the kindest people, and the experience really made me empathetic," Ellington said. "It definitely inspired me to help others."

She later moved back to Waco to work as a marketing manager for a home health company at a hospital, while also writing a weekly newspaper column called "Around Town."

Ellington's father spent mornings in the operating room as the only surgeon at a modest hospital in Nigeria when she was

from tuberculosis to typhoid. In his free time, he cared for patients in a leprosy colony.

When she was 9, Ellington moved with her family to Texas. Ellington pursued a degree in commercial art and advertising and moved to Dallas to work as a hospital volunteer coordinator.

After serving as Director of Communications and Publications for the local chamber of commerce, she returned to Dallas to complete her bachelor's degree with a focus on business communications and marketing.

She moved to San Francisco to obtain a master's degree.

Back in Dallas, she worked in economic development as a marketing manager and later a marketing director.

Ellington returned to the Bay Area in 2011 and continued her career in marketing communications with Stanford Medical Partners. In 2020, she moved to Washington state to be close to her family. She enjoys painting, playing music, writing, and spending time with her children and grandson. Her partner, Dave, is a battalion chief with the Tacoma Fire Department and a pilot/mechanic for Skydive Kapowsin.

Who is Eligible?

The following individuals cannot be nominated for EOM:

- EOM committee members, Senior Leadership and any individual under a discipline process.
- To be eligible for nomination an individual must have been employed at Mason Health at least one year prior to nomination.
- If an employee has previously been EOM, they must wait 3 years from that time to be nominated again.

Who selects the winners?

The EOM committee selects the EOM blindly (HR deletes names & identifiers from the nomination). The committee is made up of at least three employees from various departments. The committee meets quarterly. After the EOM has been selected, the members each have tasks such as setting up the presentation and making certificates. Volunteers are needed to help set up the registration tent at the





Gift Shop Volunteers:


Volunteers are needed at the Gift Shop! Shifts are three hours long and can either be weekly or every other week! Proceeds fund medically-related scholarships!
